Course Description

MUTH 110 - Theory I

3 Credit Hours: Materials of music, including basic elements through non-chord tones and 6/4 chords. Exercises in analysis, composition, and improvisation of music with emphasis on common practice.

Prerequisite(s): Grade of C or higher in MUTH 105 or satisfactory score on the music theory placement test.

Overview

This course is directed towards music majors and is the first semester of a four-semester sequence in music theory. Throughout the semester we will examine fundamental concepts of western art music. We will study the practical application of elements of diatonic harmony such as triads and seventh chords, nonchord tones, harmonic progression, part writing, and counterpoint. We will also expand our scope for musical works to include structural considerations such as cadence, phrase, period and the identification of small forms.
